# Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Education

Indigenous Education aims to improve education and retention outcomes for Aboriginal students as well as educating all students about Aboriginal history, culture and contemporary Aboriginal Australia. Our Indigenous education program aims to provide a culturally rich environment where Aboriginal students feel valued and secure.

Initiatives to support Aboriginal education included the following:

- development of support structures for all Indigenous students through the work of the Aboriginal Education Officer
- Aboriginal Students Awards Night encourages retention and student engagement in learning.
- NAIDOC Week is celebrated annually.
- The Clontarf Academy is in place to support Aboriginal boys.
- The Stars Foundation is a program supporting Indigenous girls and young women.

# Aboriginal Programs

#### **Clontarf Academy Program**

The Clontarf Academy program runs to support Aboriginal boys to be more engaged at school, to achieve school qualifications and to move into tertiary education or employment. The program has its own room where students meet before school and at break times. Students' attendance and participation in classes is monitored and then rewarded with camping trips, inter-school team sports days and other special events.

#### **Stars Foundation**

Stars provides a program that supports Indigenous girls and young women to attend and remain engaged at school, complete Year 12 and move into work or further study. The Stars room has a culturally safe, warm environment where the girls and young women feel nurtured and inspired. The program provides a diverse range of activities to support our Stars to develop the self-esteem, confidence and life skills they need to successfully participate in school and transition into a positive and independent future.

#### Assemblies

Formal Assembly/Year Meetings will be held every Thursday week B, period 2. General Assembly will be held as needed.

#### **Assessment Procedures**

Students in all years are issued with an assessment book outlining the assessment procedures and timing for all courses.

# Attendance

The Department of Education and Training and Inverell High School advise that it is a legal requirement that students attend school for the entire school day, each day that the school is open.

Absences should only occur because of Illness, natural causes (floods) or for other reasons approved by the Principal. Please note: Is in not sufficient for parents to approve absences as parents may ask permission for their child to be absent and medical certificates should be supplied where necessary. Students who are frequently absent without explanation may be referred to the Home School Liaison Officer.

# Notification of Absences

It is a legal requirement that all absences be explained in writing upon the student's return to school. Each explanation should indicate a reason for the absence and be signed by a parent or caregiver. The note is to be handed in at the Student Support Office. You may also phone the school on 6722 3777 or reply to the SMS notification to notify us of your child's absence. The school may contact parents by phone or letter if we have not received a notification regarding the absence.

If absence is likely to exceed three (3) days, the school must be notified and the Principal's approval should be obtained for any long-term absence (i.e. family holidays).

# Bikes & Skateboards

By law students must wear helmets when cycling. Care must be taken when entering and leaving school grounds. Bikes and skateboards are to be walked in the school grounds and across school crossings. All bikes should be locked in the racks provided. It is advised that all skateboards and scooters be left in the hall beside the Deputy's office.

#### **Bus travel**

It is important that your child knows what bus they will be travelling on before starting school, please contact Cavanagh Bus and Coach Inverell for pickup points and times. Students who live more than 2km radial distance from the school are eligible for free bus travel.

Buses arrive and depart from Howard Street and the bus form is in the Orientation pack or available from the school office.

# Canteen

The canteen is operated by Canteen Supervisor who oversees the daily running of the canteen. The Supervisor adheres to the Healthy Canteen Initiative that seeks to supply fresh and inviting food to students and staff. The use of mobile phones for payments at the canteen is not permitted. Instead, we encourage the use of cash or payment cards for all transactions at the canteen.

# Carnivals

Each year the school holds three carnivals, swimming, athletics and cross country. The swimming carnivals are held at the local pool, while the athletics at Varley Oval and cross country at the Motor Cross Track are Inverell High events. Competition between the house groups is keen with extra points scored for best participation. Parents and carers are a welcome and encouraged to attend.



# Cars & Driving

Students who are licensed can drive a car to school. A Safe Use of Vehicles form needs to be completed and must be returned to the school. This is a mandatory Education Department requirement.

# **Collection of money**

Students who have money to pay for school fees, subject fees, sport or excursions should take the money to the Front Office before school, at recess or lunch. Many excursions and fees are now able to be paid online via the School Bytes Parent Portal App. Payments can be made using either a Visa, MasterCard credit or debit card. The payment page can also be accessed from the front page of the school's website by selecting **MAKE A PAYMENT**.

When you access the **MAKE A PAYMENT** tab on the Inverell High School Website you must create a new School Bytes App account if you do not have one already or log into your existing account. The email address that you use to register must be the same as the email address you have supplied the school.

Items that can be paid include voluntary school contributions, subject contributions, sport fees, excursions and creative and practical arts activities (these include band, drama and dance).



#### **Curriculum Patterns**

# Emergencies

# Evacuations

A continuous ringing of the bell is the signal for everyone to leave the building and proceed to the school oval by the most sensible route.

# Lockdown

Intermittent bells will ring. If you are in class, stay there lock the door and the windows. If you are outside go straight to the MPU, enter from the oval side and listen to direction. Remain in designated area until the all clear is given, this will be in the form of 3 bells followed by an assembly and roll call.

# Equipment

All children need to be fitted out with the basic equipment of pencil, sharpener, ruler, glue stick, red, blue & black pens, eraser, scissors. For some subjects, protective clothing or special items may be required for safety or other reasons. All students need a diary as it is an essential organisational item.

# Excursions

Excursions are valuable in that they supplement the learning taking place in the classroom, by providing students with the opportunity to see and experience at first hand, places, events and objects which are being studied. Parental permission is required for all excursions. A permission note will be attached to information concerning the proposed excursion.

# First Aid

Students who are sick or injured should report to the Student Support Officer for assistance. If considered necessary, parents will be called and/or medical attention sought. The school should be informed if a student has a particular medical problem and a Health Care Plan completed.

# **Higher School Certificate**

Students have three pathways of study from which to choose.

- 1. HSC and ATAR (University Entrance) a pattern which provides an opportunity to study for the Higher School Certificate and meet requirements for calculation of an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR)
- 2. HSC, no ATAR a pattern for those students who return to school to gain a Higher School Certificate but do not intend seeking university entrance.
- 3. Life Skills HSC— this pattern leads to the completion of a credentialed Higher School Certificate. Student who present with special needs and require variation from the Board of Studies syllabus often take this pattern.

Students may choose subjects from each of the three pathways should they wish. Students may elect to complete their studies over a longer period of time should this be desirable. For example, the completion of the Higher School Certificate program usually is taken over a two-year period (Years 11 and 12) however, students may spread their studies over up to five years.

# Homework

Homework is an important part of your child's learning experience and provides them the opportunity to develop their thinking, concentration, time management and research skills. It also helps develop self-discipline, personal responsibility and independence thus a great skill for life-long learning. Good organisation and planning helps get the most out of homework time, a quiet spot in which to work, regular set times and for all students the use of a school diary all assist students to reach their full potential.

# Types of Homework

- Practice exercises: helps students to remember and practice new skills.
- Preparatory homework: students' source and read background information to prepare for future lessons and assignments.
- Extension: encourages students to pursue knowledge individually and imaginatively.
- Study: reading book and notes and preparing summary notes and completing sample tasks, exams, drafts for assessments.

# **Homework Hub**

The Homework Hub runs every Thursday afternoon from 3.30-4.30pm in the School Library. Teachers and support staff from a variety of KLA's are available on a rotational basis to assist students with completing homework, catching up missed class work or preparing for assessment tasks as required. The Homework Hub provides students with the opportunity to consolidate their learning and establish important skills and habits for academic success.

# **House Groups**

Good sportsmanship and healthy competition are encouraged and there is strong competition between the house groups at the school carnivals. Upon enrolling students are allocated a house group and families are always kept in the same house.

# Internet Use

Students can access the internet in the Library, computer labs or laptops in the classroom.

# Late to School

Each day is commenced with a compulsory roll call and students are given all relevant information for that day and attendance is marked. Any student who arrives late must sign in at the Student Support Office with a note from a parent or carer explaining why they are late to school.

# **Learning Centre**

In 2015 we established a Learning Centre in the School Library. Students may seek assistance with assignments and classwork in the centre.

# Leave Pass

Students are not permitted to leave the school grounds unless they have first forwarded a permission note from parents or carer to the Student Support Officer where a Leave Pass may be issued.

# Leaving the school or transferring

Any child leaving the school to go to another school or employment must bring a note from their parent or guardian to that effect to the front office and request a leavers clearance form. All fees must be paid, library books and texts must be returned before a clearance is granted.

# Library

The school library is a spacious comfortable facility catering to the educational needs and general interests of our students and staff. Our friendly staff members are eager to meet any requests. The library is well stocked with both fiction and non-fiction books, as well as a large selection of magazines. Class and individual library use is constant, and we welcome any incoming students or staff to make use of our book and computer resources.

#### Merit & Awards Scheme

The merit awards scheme is a component of the school's Student Welfare & Discipline Policy.

#### **Mobile Phones**

State-wide changes to mobile phone restrictions for secondary students have started with the NSW State Government implementing a ban on mobile phones in all NSW government schools. This ban will apply to all high schools and all other public high schools across the state. Our school uses a system called YONDR, which utilises a pouch that is locked with a magnetic device in order to ensure mobile digital devices are not used on school grounds during the day. Digital devices are electronic devices that can receive, store, process and share digital information and connect to applications (apps), websites and other online services. They include desktop computers, laptops, tablets, smartwatches, smartphones, wireless earphones, air buds and other devices.

Students are expected to use the unlocking stations each morning as they enter to unlock their pouch, turn their device off, place their electronic device inside their pouch and then lock their pouch. Electronic devices are to remain locked in YONDR pouches on school grounds at all times. At the end of the day, students should proceed to the unlocking stations to unlock their pouches. Tampering with your YONDR pouch, or the YONDR system will not be tolerated in any shape or form. Attempts to thwart the system will result in disciplinary action.

#### Newsletter

The School Newsletter is issued fortnightly via email unless a hard copy has been requested. It is an important document for all parents to receive as it lets you know what's happening in the school and will help you prepare your child for upcoming events. The school requests that all families who are online at home access the newsletter via the internet. To ensure you get your copy telephone the office and leave your email address or place a request for a hardcopy which will go to your child.

# **Out of School Hours**

Our goal is to develop and maintain a superior quality school for our students. With that in mind, it is important that we protect our grounds, buildings and sporting facilities. Accordingly, students and members of the public are not permitted to enter school grounds outside of normal school hours. This particularly applies to the riding of skateboards and the use of the games courts and playing fields. Police will be contacted to respond to trespassers and any students trespassing will also have to account for their actions to the school Welfare & Discipline Committee. Community groups are required to enter into contractual arrangements with the school to enable their use of school facilities.

# **Parent Meetings**

Parents and Citizens Association meet every third Tuesday of the month at Inverell High School at 6.00pm. P&C activities include managing the canteen and fundraising. The P&C provides valuable resources for the school that enhance the learning environment of all students. Your participation is most appreciated by the staff and students.

# **Permission to Publish**

All new enrolments are asked to sign a Permission to Publish section on the Enrolment Application form. The media, local council and Department Education and Training dignitaries regularly visit our school to publicise our successes. With this permission we can promote the school (and pictures of your child) in the local press and the school newsletter.

#### Phone and contact details

Please ensure you contact the school when you change your address, home phone, mobile or email address. This allows the school to stay in quick contact with you should the need arise.

#### **Reporting to Parents**

Parents are invited to make an appointment to see their child's teacher or year advisor at any time to discuss progress. Parent Teacher Nights are conducted giving you an opportunity to meet your child's teachers. Reports are issued twice a year.

#### **School Contribution**

School contributions at Inverell High School are a fee levied on the families of the school to enhance the opportunities available to the students. All families are asked to make a financial contribution to assist in the provision of sound educational programs for the students. We have a quarterly payment scheme which has been very well supported by the student body. These important contributions provide a fund from which additional materials and services can be purchased for the school. From time-to-time other activities such as dramatic performances, films and excursions involve additional expense.

Materials used in Food Technology, Visual Art, Design and Technology (Mandatory), Industrial Technology Timber, Industrial Technology Metal, Textiles Technology involve additional expense, but the finished product then becomes the property of the student.

#### **Special Religious Education**

Special Religious Education is held once a term on a Year Seminar basis. A Special Religious Education Participation form is to be completed, opting in, and returned to the front office.

#### **Sporting Events**

The school provides opportunities for students to participate in all types of individual and team sports. These include: athletics, swimming, dance, lawn bowls, cycling, softball, cricket, indoor cricket, tennis, soccer, hockey, touch football, golf, rowing, basketball, netball, table tennis, walking and yoga. Representatives on the SRC are elected by their fellow classmates or peers. The SRC organise many activities such as socials, sporting events, barbeques and community service projects. The SRC also raises funds to buy new equipment for the school and to assist charities.

#### **Student Assistance**

Parents and students who may be experiencing financial difficulty to purchase equipment, uniforms or help to pay excursions may apply for assistance from the school. These funds are strictly limited and they are distributed on a need's basis. Parents and caregivers can obtain an application form from the front office or contact the Principal and confidentiality is assured.

# Uniform

The Inverell High School P & C has determined that Inverell High School will be a uniform-wearing school. The P & C has requested that the school enforce the wearing of the school uniform without variation. This means that students are expected to dress in the uniform as described below. Parents who are uncertain as to whether or not an item of clothing meets this policy's requirements should consult with a Deputy Principal or the Principal prior to purchasing the item. Regular checks of student dress are conducted. Students out of uniform are afforded a warning, further breaches of the dress requirements are dealt in accordance with the school Student Welfare and Discipline Policy.

A pool of school blazers and ties are also maintained by the Front Office for students to use on occasions where they represent the school.

The following items are not acceptable school wear (even on SRC non uniform days): Beach wear, football socks, tank tops, singlets, football jumpers, tracksuits under skirts (either/or), multi coloured jumpers or tops, hoodies, thongs. T-shirts or sloppy joes with a logo are unacceptable.

**Lost property** - Lost property is held until the end of term at the Student Support Office and is then washed and placed in our welfare cupboard.

# **Practical subjects**

It is advised that students require the appropriate protective clothing for Science, Agriculture, Visual Art, Technology and Food Technology. For practical lessons, students must wear shoes with a solid sole and leather uppers.

#### Visitors to the School

As a safety measure for all staff and students all visitors must report to the Front Office and sign in.

# School Uniform Requirements & Procedures

This guide outlines the School's Uniform Requirements and Procedures and provides a guide to parents and students as to what meets requirements for uniforms.

The Department of Education supports the wearing of school uniforms by students and the upholding of high standards of dress by students.

Inverell High School has a proud tradition and reputation in the Inverell community, and is readily identified by the colours Red & Black.

# Why is there a School Uniform?

The wearing of school uniform assists the school in:

- Defining an identity for the school within its community
- Developing students' sense of belonging to the school community
- Providing an opportunity to build school spirit
- Enhancing the health and safety of students when involved in school activities
- Promoting a sense of inclusiveness, non-discrimination and equal opportunity
- Representing the school as an ordered and safe environment
- Increasing personal safety of students and staff by allowing easier recognition of visitors and potential intruders in the school
- Making school clothing more affordable for families by eliminating the risk of peer pressure to wear fashionable and expensive clothes.

#### **Legislative Requirements**

Under the NSW Work Health and Safety Act 2011 the department must do everything reasonably practicable to ensure that students are not exposed to risks to their health or safety while they are on departmental premises.



# **General Principles Guiding Uniform**

The following principles may assist in ensuring items purchased/worn meet the uniform standard:

- The items are designed as neat, long-wearing and of sturdy material.
  - A school uniform should last at least a year (excluding outgrowing a uniform).
- The items purchased are intended to be marketed as school uniform items.
  - A number of fashion labels have begun manufacturing items that closely resemble school uniform that is made of a lightweight/casual material, or contain intricate pinstripe/check patterns. These items do not meet the requirements of plain and sturdy.
- Any articles of clothing worn underneath should not be visible.
  - The wearing of "hoodies", tights and leggings is NOT permitted.
  - Articles of clothing worn underneath white shirts should not have motifs/logos visible through the material.
  - Items of underwear should not be visible.

# Other Items

The following rules also apply to students' appearance:

Accessories (eg Bags/Hats)	<ul> <li>Should not contain offensive motifs or drug references</li> <li>Should be modest and match school colours where possible</li> </ul>

# Access to School Uniform

School uniforms are designed in order to ensure costs are economical as possible. The school is able to assist families experiencing hardship in obtaining school uniform through school support funds and the uniform pool.

A uniform pool operates at the school where items of school uniform may be purchased at less than cost price, and where school clothing no longer required may be left for sale or donation. All uniform items for sale are of appropriate quality and properly laundered.

# 'One Off' Occurrences of Students Being Out Of Uniform

There will be some occasions where students cannot wear full school uniform. On these occasions students should wear as much of school uniform as possible. Parents should provide a note with the student explaining why their child is not in uniform. This needs to be presented to the Deputy Principals at the start of the day.

# **Requirements for Practical PE Lessons**

Student's PDHPE teachers will indicate when particular practical lessons are planned.

- If a practical lesson is scheduled for Period 1 of a day, students may arrive at school in their sports clothes.
- Students must change into their full normal school uniform at the conclusion of the lesson.
- Where a lesson falls within the middle of the school day, students must wear normal uniform and change only for that lesson.

# \*Footwear Requirements

The school is bound by legislation to ensure the safety of staff and students when on school grounds. Students may be excluded from some practical activities or areas in the footwear they are wearing is deemed unsuitable. Regardless, of if students are enrolled in subjects that are in these areas, the requirements are the same for all students.

Shoes for normal school days should meet the following requirements:

- Have laces or a similar securing mechanism that is functional (ie. No slip on shoes permitted)
- Have a leather (or strong vinyl) upper that completely covers the shoe, or steel capped uppers
- Have a substantial sole (A substantial sole should be able to tread on a thumb tack and not cause injury to the wearer)
- Be black in colour

Shoes for sports and PE activities should meet the following requirements:

- Have laces (that are functional and suitably fastened)
- Have a solid covered toe point and supporting structure
- Have supportive arches
- Have a substantial sole for athletic activity

# **Managing School Uniform Requirements**

Head Teacher Welfare and Deputy Principals will monitor students' uniform. However, school wide uniform inspections will occur regularly at school assemblies. Additional uniform inspections may occur at random times by the school executive and welfare team.

Staff at any time may direct students to take action to comply with uniform requirements. Eg. Remove make-up or take off hats, jumpers, jackets. Staff should contact Deputy Principals with concerns about students not in uniform. Students will be issued with an 'out of uniform' pass.

A register of uniform breaches is recorded in the school's student attendance and welfare tracking system.

# **Consequences of Non-Compliance with School Uniform Requirements**

Students who consistently do not comply the school uniform requirements may be placed on Level 2 - Uniform which may prevent them from participating in the following activities, as outlined in the school's welfare and discipline policy:


- Participation in Representative Sports and Extra-Curricular Activities

- Other activities as determined by the School Executive


# Special Circumstances of Non-Compliance with School Uniform Requirements


Where the health and safety of the student or of other students would otherwise be compromised, students may be excluded from certain educational activities.

Alternative educational activities (where practicable) will be provided in such circumstances.

Such action may also be required if a student's clothing compromises agreed upon school community standards and might be considered damaging to the image of the school in the larger community context.
